


REMINDER: School Times of Opening

Playground open: 8:30am Doors open: 8:50am

Morning Session: 9.00 am - 12.00 pm Afternoon Session: 1.15 pm - 3.35 pm

Children should arrive before the opening of the school and make their way straight on to either the Lower or Upper School playgrounds, a member of staff is on each playground from 8:30am to supervise the children. At 8.50am, the school doors are opened and the children go to their classrooms, where a 'starter' activity will be prepared for them. Registration takes place at 9.00am. So as to avoid any missed learning opportunity, all children should be in school for 8:50am.

It is important for parents to understand that, although staff are in school from 7.00am, **there is no direct supervision until 8.30am** and therefore, until this point, children are still the responsibility of their parents.



Are you Updated?

Arbor It is critical that we hold the accurate information for our children and their families. This includes <u>addresses</u> and <u>contact numbers</u> as well as <u>any relevant permission</u> and <u>medical information</u>. This can be easily done by logging into your Arbor account and updating.

Continued Road and Parking Concerns

I ask for everyone who either picks-up or drops-off children by car to please prioritise the safety of our pupils by being vigilant about parking around the school. Kindly adhere to designated drop-off and pick-up areas, avoid double parking, and ensure driveways remain unobstructed. Please refrain from reversing into the school and residents' driveways, as well as the entrance to the farmer's field next to the Lower School gate.

Please avoid parking on the double yellow lines in front of the Lower School gate during drop-off, as it poses safety risks. I appreciate some might be running a little late in a morning, but the safety of our children and the safety of the others on the road must be our first priority. Your cooperation is key to fostering a secure environment for our pupils and community. Thank you for your understanding on this matter.



Additionally, parents and carers should not be using the staff car park either at drop-off or pick-up without first seeking permission from the school. There are a very small number of families who require this use, who I have already agreed to the use of the car park due to their needs. However, earlier this week it was bedlam in our car park. A number of cars were parked in various locations creating traffic jams and unsafe areas for the children crossing and trying to safely make their way home. I appreciate it might appear easier to park so closely in order to collect your child swiftly, however, thought must be given to the necessity of this and to the safety of others. If you believe you need access to the car park and have not previously contacted the school to discuss this, then please refrain from using the car park until a discussion has been had and permission granted.













Brian Barnes – Stratagem Award

Some of you might know that GJS have an award called the Stratagem Award. This award is presented to a Year 6 pupil as part of the leavers' celebrations. This child has also demonstrated their resilience and determination to achieve in life as this award was donated by Brian to the school after he sailed singlehandedly around the world in his boat, The Stratagem. Sadly, of recent years, Brian has not been able to present this award at school due to his failing health, and on 10th April 2024, Brian passed away peacefully at home. Brian was an amazing man. Born in Preston in 1934, he swam in the Helsinki Olympics in 1952 then had a long career in leisure services. After retiring from his post as Director of Leisure Services for Wirral he sailed around the world in his boat Stratagem. It was at this time he

became so connected with the pupils at GJS as we used to send him messages of good luck. Throughout his life he was a keen promoter of sport being accessible for all, particularly the disabled, and was invited to carry the torch for the Paralympic games. We are saddened by this news, but will continue to present this award each year in honour of Brian and his exceptional character!



Online Safety

While scrolling online, you'll almost inevitably have come across posts or links with headlines like "You Won't Believe These 10 Crazy Facts about ...". Such lurid language — and the often-dubious nature of the content it promotes — has become something of a running joke on the internet. Yet while these articles are often laughed at by communities online, they can have an insidious side.

Clickbait, as it's known, can frequently function as part of a trap: intended to draw users in for the sake of advertising revenue or, in worse cases, masking an attempting to collect their personal information.
